

February—Albuquerque Sunport (three display cases that are 12x6 feet and 2 feet deep). Exhibit only; no sales. This is an outreach opportunity. August—Tortuga Gallery: *Through the Eyes of Women*

There is an opportunity to show at Zendo Café Downtown July or later 2023. Details to follow. The group voted against having a show at Fusion in 2023. Although it is a reported to be a good place to hang art, it is expensive. Also they do not handle sales and it is uncertain how many eyes actually see the art since it is not a site regularly open to the public. We should keep an eye on Fusion as it gains popularity. Theater season is Oct-Dec and it's available for other events and meetings.
