April Program: Owning an Art Gallery Presenter: Jill Logan, Tortuga Gallery Facilitated by Janine Wilson Sunday, April 15, 2-4 pm OFFCenter Community Arts 808 Park Avenue SW

Jill Logan will talk about the history of Tortuga gallery and the joys and challenges of owning a gallery.

The building that houses Tortuga was built sometime in the 1880s when the railroad came through Albuquerque. Its original purpose was a General store for the neighborhood and it has had many functions since then. According to our neighbors, it has been a cabinet shop, laundromat, a food distribution center and a YMCA.

"Tortuga provides space for community gatherings, music, poetry and art," says Jill Logan and Pax Garcia, owners of the Gallery. "Although we call ourselves an art gallery, we invite many other groups to participate and use the space."

Ginger Quinn and Jackie Hertel are collaborating in a Community Art Project celebrating the conservation of the beautiful Kemp's Ridley sea turtles in the Gulf of Mexico and beyond. The turtles were on the brink of extinction in 1978. "Success After 40 Years of Kemp's Ridley Sea Turtle Conservation" is an exhibit of fiber art at the Padre Island National Seashore Headquarters in Corpus Christi, Texas. Coordinated by the International Fiber Collective (IFC) and the turtle conservationists, the exhibit will run through summer, 2018. Ginger's and Jackie's 25" by 25" submission, entitled "Turtles on the Rise", consists of geli plate monoprinted fabric pieces joined, attached and embellished with a varie ty of hand stitching on canvas. Exhibited works are not for sale but are created and shared to inspire, educate and create community among both concerned artists and the viewing public. (Image below)


Marian Berg had a very successful opening at O'Niell's, reporting that she sold seven paintings, some of her fused glass earrings and sun catchers, and lots of cards.
