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ARTspiration



Art for Art's Sake

Art for the sake of art is the belief that art has intrinsic worth irrespective of any political, social, or ethical relevance.

The concept can be traced back to the European Romantic movement when artists and intellectuals started advocating for the idea that art should be appreciated for its intrinsic characteristics rather than for any external or utilitarian role.

One of the individuals involved with the formation of the notion of art for the sake of art was Immanuel Kant, the German philosopher. Kant asserted in his important book *The Critique of Judgment* (1790) that the ultimate goal of art was to offer an enjoyable experience independent of any utilitarian or moral concerns.

The concept of appreciating art for its inherent characteristics was fundamental in the development of many movements in the 19th and 20th centuries. Notable art movements such as Symbolism, Impressionism, Post-Impressionism and Abstract Expressionism, welcomed the concept of art as a vehicle of personal expression and concentrated on examining the formal components of art. These movements stressed the importance of subjective interpretation and experimentation with new creative approaches to the aesthetic experience. It has additionally promoted the concepts of artistic independence and individuality in art.

This concept challenges the assumption that art should fulfill certain purposes, whether they be political or moral in nature. This critique has been especially pertinent in questioning the commercialization of art, in which art is evaluated largely for its monetary value or ability to transmit certain ideas, as opposed to for its fundamental aesthetic value.
