Rainbow Artists Monthly Meeting Tuesday, November 21, 2 pm North Fourth Art Center 4904 Fourth St. NW Program: Icons by Sue Ellen Rael

Sue Ellen Rael will discuss icons, a little about their history and show us a variety of techniques for writing icons. If you are interested in making an icon yourself, bring a clayboard size 2x2 or larger, (Ampersand makes them, Artesan Santa Fe in Santa Fe has them), a small pallet and small brushes. Other materials needed will be provided. You may take them to finish at home.

Rael works in egg tempera on a variety of wood panels in a Russian orthodox tradition. At first she focused on orthodox images and then western religious images. More recently she has begun to expand this technique to secular subjects. Whatever the subject, she spends time researching the image or subject, developing the cartoon/sketch and formulating the sequences of pigments/paints before she begins painting.

In our September meeting it also became apparent that there is a division of thought on future shows—an apparent lack of interest in cohesive shows with a theme and the desire to show somewhere besides coffee shops and restaurants. Rainbow has a history of themed shows ... broad enough to be inclusive yet thought provoking enough to attract attention outside our bubble. Remember *What Tribe are You?, Kindred Spirits, Over the Rainbow,* the *Pocket Project?* In 2023, four out of five shows were simply "Untitled".

We need to continue this discussion; it affects our ability to book group shows.

# The Never-Ending Inquiry

Painting can be a solitary endeavor, but growing as an artist is not. All good painters must, at least to some degree, remain students at heart.

We tap into the wisdom of other creatives who may have the answers we seek, whether it's in the form of an instructor, a masterpiece hanging on the museum wall or a book like the one I have been diving into recently, *The Landscape Painter's Workbook: Essential Studies in Shape, Composition and Color.* 

Although I have been painting for years, I still struggle with simplification at times. Here are some thoughts from the book's author, Mitchell Albala.

- Simplification is practical. The natural world presents so much information, across such a wide field, that to create a clear and visually concise picture of nature, we have no choice but to simplify. Simplification is a visual imperative.
- Simplification is our starting point. A painting develops in stages from the general to the specific. We begin a painting with simplified foundational shapes; smaller elements or details are integrated into the foundational shapes later.
- Simplification is beautiful. A subject that undergoes the translation from complex to simple is elegant, a demonstration of the visual poetry of a landscape painting.

A poet expresses an idea or emotion in a metered string of carefully chosen words. Similarly, when a painter converts nature's excesses into more visually concise and meaningful shapes, it is nothing less than visual poetry. A painting simplified in this way doesn't tell the whole story. The observer must fill in the gaps in their mind's eye which evokes a different response than a painting that tells the viewer everything.
